

SACRAMENTO: CRIMINALIZATION OF PEOPLE EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS

Based on California's New Vagrancy Laws: The Growing Enactment & Enforcement of Anti-Homeless Laws in the Golden State


CA Context: Illegal to be homeless: In the 58 cities studied, there are 500 laws restricting and criminalizing people experiencing homelessness in 4 categories: [1] standing, sitting and resting in public places [daytime activities; [2] sleeping, camping & lodging in public places, including vehicles [nighttime activities]; [3] begging and panhandling, and [4] food sharing with homeless people – an average of 9 anti-homeless laws per city. These 500 laws impose 581 separate restrictions on homeless people. The number of anti-homeless laws in CA has increased from 36 [1960] to over 100 in 2010. Compared to other U.S. cities, CA cities have more anti-homeless laws restricting many more types of behavior.

Sacramento:

- City of Sacramento has 11 municipal codes criminalizing daily activities associated with homelessness:
 - 5 codes criminalize standing, sitting and resting in public places;
 - 3 codes that criminalize camping and lodging in public places;
 - 3 codes that criminalize begging & panhandling
- Sacramento City Code Section 12.52.030 bans camping on public or private property unless lawfully authorized.


1,201 crime reports on homeless "offenses" [standing; camping, panhandling] from 2004 – 2014 69% [831 of the 1,201 crime reports] of the homeless "offenses" were cited under <u>one code</u>: anti-camping or MC 12.52.030: See *Figure 1*





2,700 illegal camping citations from 2012 – 2014 [Figure 2]: Why? Illegal camping enforcement is
a priority for the Sacramento County Board of Supervisors giving in to political pressure & gentrification
issues

- Harassment: In 2013 survey of 150 Sacramento homeless people by the Western Regional Advocacy Project:
 - 97% reported being harassed by the police for <u>appearing</u> homeless;
 - 97% reported being harassed by police for sleeping in public;
 - 63% reported being cited by police for sleeping in public;
 - 38% reported being cited for camping.
